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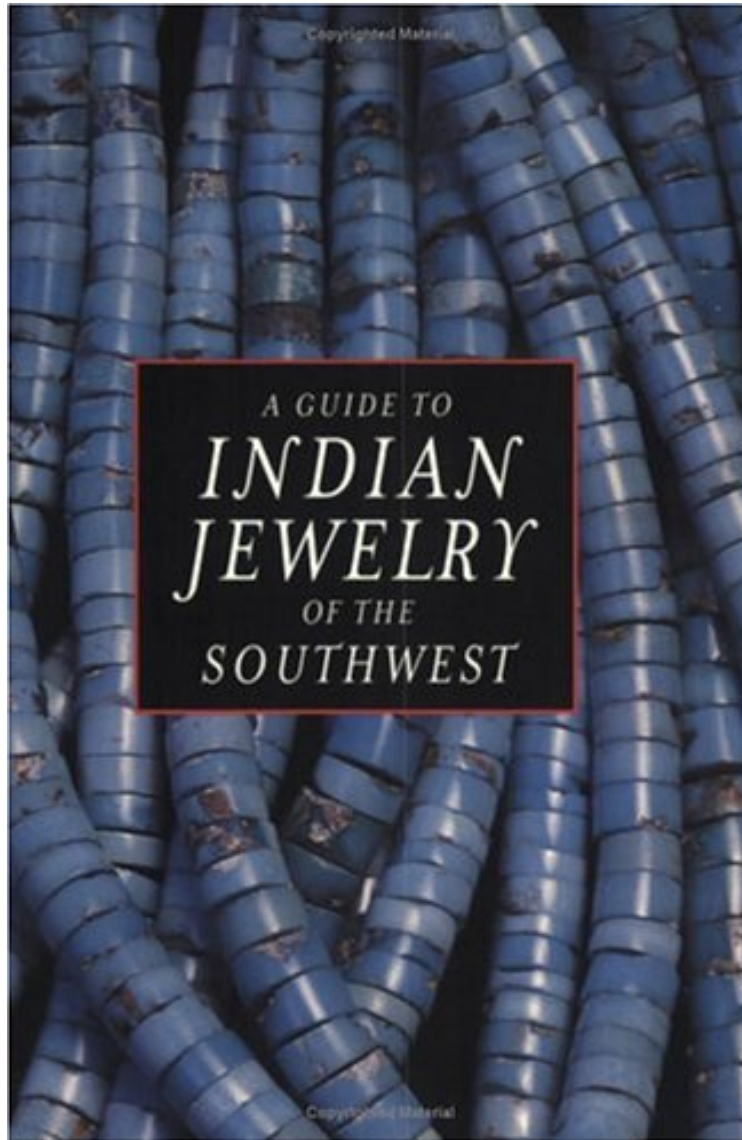

This alone might be worth the price of the book.Different styles of jewelry from different tribes are pictured and described, including the techniques of mosaic inlay.The photos are good and well reproduced.
