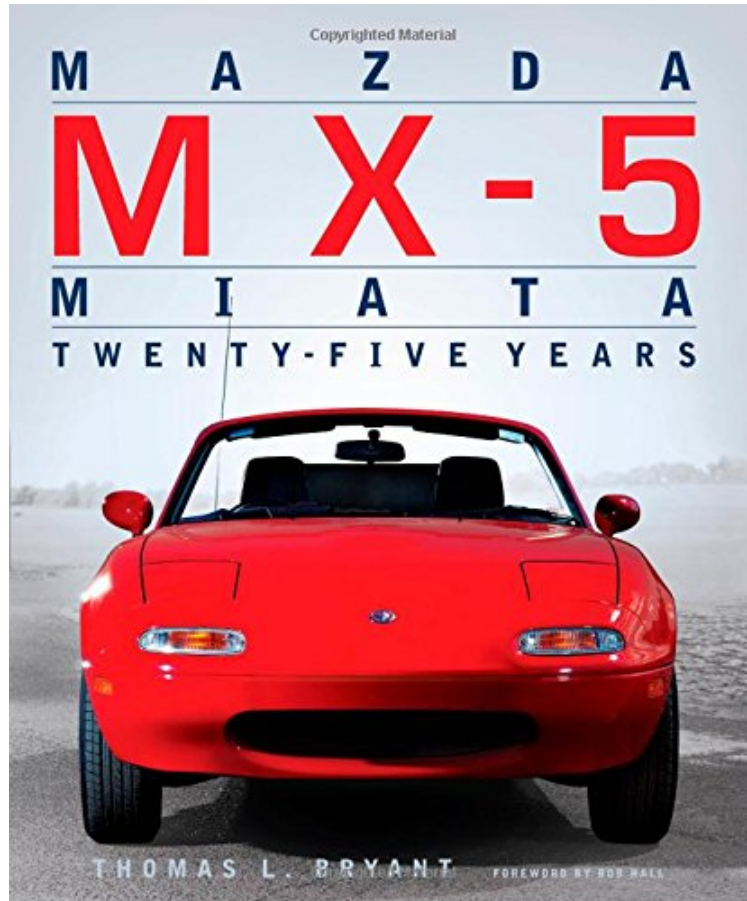

downplayed and Bob Hall's role in the development is certainly not represented. This could have been the classic definition of 25 years of a sports car that actually works every day but it's not. Nor is it oriented towards the US enthusiast, entirely bypassing the likes of Keith Tanner and the Flying Miata crowd that has done more for Miata's than most.
