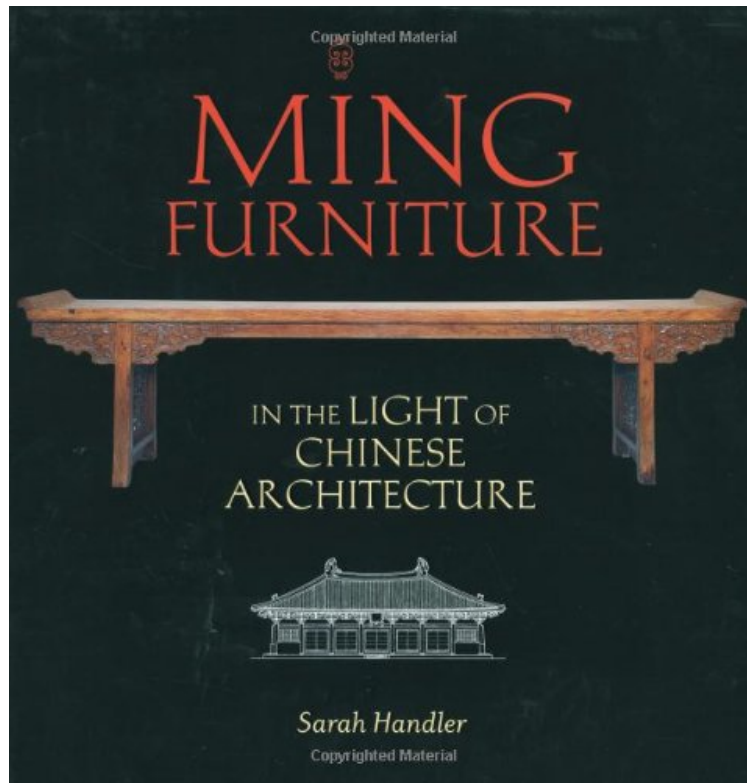

The organization by furniture type (i.e. chairs, tables, beds, cabinets)makes it easy to use as a reference book. The text is beautifully written and highly informative, filled with quotations poems about Chinese culture and history. This is not a text that focuses only on cabinet-making. It explains the relationship between Chinese architecture furniture. The photographs are not only beautiful, they also illustrate expand upon the text in that they include current photos of furniture as well as historical paintings illustrations showing the context for the objects. The book has an index, bibliography, and endnotes.
