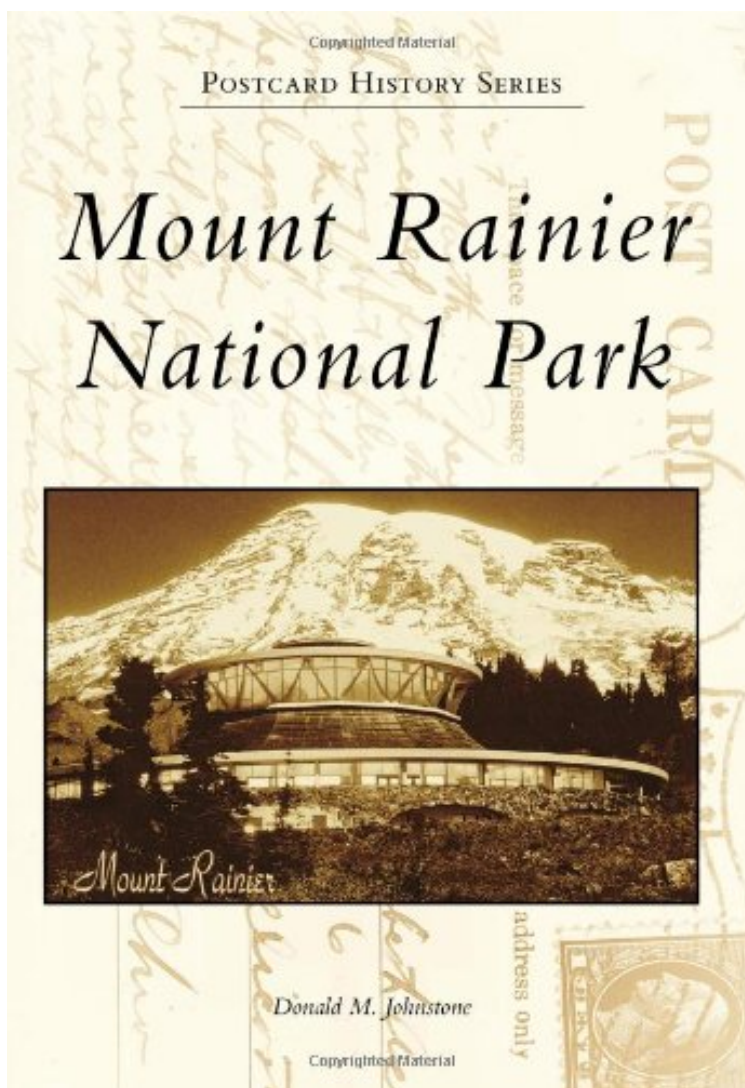

The book has a picture of a golf course in the past in Mount Rainier National Park. In the early 1920's, the Rainier National Park Company experimented with several unusual visitor services that

they hoped would be profitable. One of these experiments was a nine-hole golf course located in Paradise Valley. The golf course was not a success and as a result, it was discontinued. The book mentioned that Paradise is one of the snowiest places in the world. During the 1971-1972 season, snowfall at Paradise was measured at 93 feet, 6 inches. The book mentions about James Longmire being an early pioneer to Western Washington. Captain George Vancouver named Mount Rainier after his friend Rear Admiral Peter Rainier.

Mount Rainier rises 14,410 feet above sea level and can be seen on any given day by over three million people and from over 100 miles away. It is America's fifth national park, established in 1899. The mountain is an active but currently dormant volcano. With 25 named glaciers, 50 smaller unnamed glaciers, and numerous perennial snowfields, Mount Rainier boasts the largest glacier system in the continental United States. In addition to the glacier zone, the park has alpine and subalpine forest and subtropical rain forest. Each zone has its own unique ecology of plants and animals. The vistas of and from the mountain are some of the most spectacular in all of the park system.
